# Official Course description (from the university course cataloa)

As an introduction to the art of playwriting, this course is structured to acquaint students with the necessary creative building blocks of character, action, setting, event, and performance. This class explores what makes a good play, emphasizing the development of both stories and playwriting techniques.

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# **Course learning objectives**

In this course, we will ...

- 1. Work to understand what compels us, what drives us, and how we can always write from this place of passion.
- 2. Experiment with a variety of techniques that we can add to our creative toolbox
- 3. Use our personal biographies, world views, and cultures to express our inner truths as we understand them in this moment of radical change and how to express them in a theatrical context.
- 4. Explore how we can use playwriting to craft bold stories that challenge our communities and ourselves.
- 5. Develop a method of receiving and sharing feedback to help our fellow writers, and ourselves, achieve our creative visions.

# **Instructional Materials**

For this class, you need the following:

<u>One Composition Notebook/Journal</u>. Go to any bookstore, any 99c store, office supply store, or (if you dare!!!) an art store like Blick, and browse their journals. Go through them until you see the option that yells at you:

YO!
YOU!
YOU WANT TO WRITE IN ME!
YOU WANT TO FILL ME WITH ALL YOUR AWESOME IDEAS!
PIIIICK MEEEE!

Personally, my favorite is the Moleskine 5x8.5 Cahier Journals with no lines. They are light enough that I can take it with me anywhere I go but sturdy with nice paper and easy to write in.

But this is what I like. What do you like? Go find that option!

<u>A pen with which you will write.</u> That same store will inevitably sell pens BUT you can go somewhere else if you are feeling like having an adventure. And we want PENS not pencils. We want to be able to scratch out words, etc

Explore the options find the pen you want. Which one feels good in your hands. Which one writes in a way that makes your handwriting look great. What color ink? What weight? What shape?

Again if you need a suggestion, my current favorite pen is the <u>uni-ball Jetstream RT Retractable</u> Rollerball Pen with black ink. It's cheap enough that I can carry them around and not get sad when I inevitably lose them, but they write wonderfully and feel great. I also really like the <u>Zebra F-301 Pen</u> for similar reasons - it's a bit heavier so if you like to feel the weight of your pen it may also be a great option for you.

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What is important is that you explore and choose your journal and pen(s) among a set of alternatives.

### Your Willingness, Bravery, and Full-Self

Every playwright I love is daring, bold, and passionate. They create theatre that terrifies them and what fills them with infinite joy. They imagine worlds and possibilities that humans can only manifest in the deepest recesses of their minds when existing in their dreamworld realities.

I am challenging you to do the same.
We will hold each other to this standard.

# **Grading Policy**

Because this is school, we must have grades. I think a lot about how we "grade" ourselves in a writing course, which is ultimately a journey that we will all start at different places.

Ultimately, I think about your grade as the contract between us. It is a way to evaluate our accountability to one another. What this means will be different for all of us. Hopefully, we can agree on a few key elements:

- 1. We must write to be successful in a writing class
- 2. We must show up for ourselves and our fellow writers
- 3. We must set ourselves challenges and work to achieve them

The way I (approximately) align these elements and Pace's grading policies are as follows:

# Assignments & Homework (Subject to Change!)

Through this class, each playwright (that's you!) will write, and rewrite A TEN MINUTE PLAY that we will present at the end of class. To do so, we will write and participate in the following: as follows:

- 1. Guided, in-class writing assignments
- 2. Weekly Writing Assignments
- 3. Larger writing Assignments
- 4. Guided Feedback Systems

This work is designed to help you explore your craft as a playwright, and understand how you can bring your full, creative self to any future writing you will create.

Students are evaluated by their willingness to complete projects and engage with and participate in the creative process. If this sounds vague, don't worry! All will be made clear in class. :)

### **Course Accountability**

Any creative act, and especially the writing process, is ultimately a challenge in showing up. The blank page will not be filled with our ideas, and the world will not receive them if we do not sit down and put them on paper.

Writers Write. Simple as that.

So we have to show up. For ourselves and for our community. The world desperately needs your words, whether it realizes it or not. Because your words can inspire revolutions. Your words can dissolve oppressions and illuminate unforeseen truths.

The ugly truth of it is that there are powerful forces that are designed to block your vision and your truths from coming out. Some of these systemic: Jobs. Other classes. Subways that are always late. Some are our own blocks that we put up. My work wasn't good enough to share. I'm just not up to it today. All the things. Right?

Writers Write. Simple as that.

So we have to show up. We are here to forge ahead. And it's those times when the above blocks appear when we need to show up the most. When it's the most important. When it matters most.



As such we have an accountability system for this class. That accountability system is as follows:

- We agree to attend all in-person classes, online sessions, and other programming to our fullest ability.
- We agree to fully participate and share the experience of being in this class with our peers and instructor to our fullest ability.
- We agree to hold ourselves to the highest standard and will meet the demands of work including when, how, and what we present.

So what does "fullest ability" mean? It means that we recognize that there are going to be times when life makes attending and participating impossible. Or possibly harmful. This class is not our sole priority. But it is a priority. Attending and Participating is the norm. It is the expectation that our writing and our creative selves, and our deep-down-chakra-selves demand. And as such, when we don't attend, when we don't participate, we accept our accountability when we fail ourselves and our community.

As such we agree to the following:

### Attendance Agreement

We agree that there is ONE EXCUSED ABSENCE. If I do not attend class, I will notify the instructor to the best of my abilities and at least 24 hrs (if possible) of this absence. This is what an "excused absence means in this class.

If I miss a class beyond this point:

- 1. I will lose 2pts for each absence and I will not receive any credit for participation for that day.
- I am responsible for determining what I missed and will talk with others in the class to find out what I missed (the instructor is not responsible for catching up a student who misses class)
- 3. If an assignment was due or to be presented, I will not receive credit
- 4. If an assignment was accomplished in class, I will not receive credit
- 5. If I miss more than three classes, I have not been accountable to myself or my community. I will not be able to pass this class without a conversation with the professor.

#### Participation

We agree to fully participate in all discussions as best as we can:

- 1. We will provide feedback and responses to shared work with openness, kindness, and grace to the creators
- 2. We will learn and use Liz Lerman's Critical Response System
- 3. When asked to respond, we will do so.
- 4. We keep all phones, tablets, and laptops stored during class.
- 5. If I have an issue in class, If I feel unsafe, I will contact the instructor. If I am comfortable doing so, I will contact my academic advisor to discuss the appropriate actions.



If we do not honor these agreements we will be held accountable, and we may be asked to address this in class, may need to discuss with the instructor outside of class, and it is possible I may be asked to remove myself from the class, which will result in me not receiving credit for it.

### Assignments Due Date and Late Assignments

We all agree to turn in assignments on time, to hold ourselves accountable, and to support the work of our fellow writers and the instructor.

If I do not turn it in on time, my work will be docked 25% points. After three days, students may turn in the paper by the end of the class with the maximum availability of 50% of the total.

#### Plagiarism

I will only submit my own work. To submit someone else's work as my own is one of the most disrespectful acts I can commit in a writing class. I will not do it.

If I am caught for plagiarism I agree to leave the class immediately. I will not receive credit. I am aware that the instructor will inform the Writing Department, who will determine what further actions to take, and from that point on, the instructor will not be involved and is not responsible for what happens.
